## Oostende - Stad aan Zee - City on the Sea



Four hundred and five pairs are contesting the 7th European Bridge Mixed Championships which are being held in Ostend for the first time since 1992. That is less than the 456 pairs who competed in Bellaria in 2000, but then there were 171 Italian pairs against the 75 competing here. The six previous Championships have seen pairs from six different countries atop the rostrum - France, Poland, Germany, Austria, Sweden and Italy. Our hosts have 37 pairs in the lists - perhaps they will provide number seven?

## Mixed Pairs

There will be a carryover from the qualifications, the final result of it counting as one session. (The formula given on page 23 of the conditions of contest is not correct: the figure " 2 " should be read as " 3 ." This applies for both the Finals and the Consolation).

## Smoking can Seriously Damage Your Wealth



If you are caught smoking in the playing area or toilets you will be fined $25 \%$ of the matchpoints available on a board during the session plus a fine of $€ 60$. Constant infractions will result in disqualification. Failure to pay the fine will result in further sanctions.

## Don't Phone a Friend



If you are caught with a mobile phone or technological instrument in the playing area or toilets you will be fined $100 \%$ of the matchpoints available on a board during the session plus a fine of $€ 100$. This penalty is mandatory. Failure to pay the fine will result in further sanctions.


## Don't Drink and Deal

If you are caught drinking alcohol in the playing area or toilets you will be fined $25 \%$ of the matchpoints available on a board during the session plus a fine of $€ 60$. Constant infractions will result in disqualification. Failure to pay the fine will result in further sanctions.

## Restaurant

You will find a Restaurant, Caféteria and bar on the first floor, just above the
 playing room. Meals, sandwiches and drinks are available and we are assured the service is fast!
During the afternoon sessions for those not watching their waist lines, pastries will be available.

Rodwell knew his partner's shape but elected to play in notrumps. West led the queen of clubs and declarer won, crossed to dummy with the ace of diamonds and played the ten of spades, covered in turn by the jack, queen and king. West switched to the jack of hearts and declarer won in hand crossed to the queen of diamonds and played a spade to the eight. When West discarded declarer had only one chance, to exit with a low diamond, hoping East would have to win with the jack and be endplayed. No luck and the club return put the contract two down.

If declarer had run the six of spades he would have made eleven tricks. Three deals to illustrate that Hamman's Syndrome is alive and well.
