Last year Bulgarians were also very close to triumph, only 1 imp after the winning team from Croatia. This year they insured fine difference of 10 VPs before the last round, so no overtricks could hurt them.

Is it really necessary really to mention that another record was broken with 102 teams participating in the Open teams event? So far we broke all previous records... what about the Open pair tournament? 268 was the record achieved in 2003, and last year we had only 229. JUST-IN-TIME CONVENTIONS

My partner and I are famous for devising new conventions while bidding actual hands in a tournament. It's a special pleasure to invent and immediately make a conventional bid and than look to see how partner squirms in an effort to guess what your new conventional bid shows. Partner can't even search for an excuse saying that he forgot a convention, since you haven't even given him a chance remember it in the first place! Take this example:

1♥* - just-in-time convention, to be called in future a "Houdini canapé", meant to show an extremely weak suit likely to be held by the opponents, and to conceal other more substantial suits.

2♥** - just-in-time convention, to be called in future "Caritas raise", meant to show weak 3-card support. Holding four card support, one would of course double partner's 1♥ bid (if opponent's do not allow us to double partner's bid, things could still turn out well, as director's ruling might be: 60% for opponents, 40% for us. That is by no means a bad score after the start of just-in-time conventional sequence).

3♣*** - just-in-time convention, to be called in future "I will never let them play 2♠ in Mitchell tournament". Please note that pass would also be conventional in this sequence and would mean that I don't mind letting them to play 2♠ in Mitchell tournament.

3♥**** - just-in-time convention, to be called in future "penalizer", meant to show to opponents that it is time to apply the axe. Subsequently, partner is allowed to super-accept via redouble, or run to some other contract, as long as it is more expensive than currently doubled one.

d'ble***** - it's comforting to see that at least one of the opponents is understanding our sequence!

However, if you bid in such an avant garde fashion, you need some luck in playing the cards. Your main advantage is that opponents are so impressed with your just-in-time conventions that their defense tends to be suboptimal. In this example, defense cooperated so well with declarer, that he produced a full eight tricks in 3 hearts doubled! That meant one down and 100 for EW, but 60% of match points for NS! How good a result is 3♥ doubled and down one for NS? Well, some EW pairs played and made 2♥ so our score of -100 easily beats -110 scored their way. One intriguing thought at the end – our bidding was avant garde, but it would be even more cool to let the opponents bid up to 2♥ and than to bid 3♥ as a sacrifice bid against that. Suddenly I'm getting new ideas for new just-in-time conventions ☺

So, if you like just-in-time conventions, feel free to use them, but do not say anything to you partner before. It is the surprise factor you are betting on!

INTERVIEW

Georgi Matusko

Well, this is my last interview for this year so I had to find someone really good for the end. Who else would be that good as this year's winner of the Men's pairs, Georgi Matusko. As the last part of the Open teams is starting in a half an hour, and he is also playing, this interview will be somewhat shorter than the previous ones, but not less interesting for sure.

Interviewer: When did you start playing bridge?

Matusko: I started playing 11 to 12 years ago.

Interviewer: How did you get interested in bridge?

Matusko: I was studying at the university, and I used to play many different card games with my friends, mostly "Preference", then I bought a book about bridge and read it and got interested in bridge, I taught some of my friends, and we played home bridge for about a year. Then I heard about a bridge club in Moscow, and started playing tournament bridge.

Interviewer: What is your best result so far?

Matusko: It is certainly the 3rd place in the Olympics in Istanbul in 2004, my other good result is 5th place in 1998 on European Youth Team Championships in Vienna, there were some other results but they were local.

Interviewer: Who is your regular partner?

Matusko: I played with Maxim Khven for 8 years, he was my partner in Istanbul, but now I'm playing with Yuri Khokhlov, we have been playing together for 6 months now, and we are preparing for the next team championship. He also played for the team in Istanbul, just not with me.

Interviewer: Is this your first time at the Pula Bridge Festival?

Matusko: No, actually I was here three years ago, in 2003.

Interviewer: What is your opinion about the festival?

Matusko: I like it very much, I came this year with my daughter, and next year I will come with my son, he is 5 years old and still a bit too young. I like the Pula Bridge Festival because it is also a great vacation, weather is still nice and I can rest here, have some fun and play bridge. What else can I possibly need.

Interviewer: What do you think about the quality of bridge here?

Matusko: The bridge is good here, it is not the most serious tournament, but the quality of bridge is still pretty high.

Interviewer: You have won the Men's pairs this year...

Matusko: Yes I have, I played with my partner Yuri Khokhlov, it was good practice for us.

Interviewer: What advice can you give other bridge players?

Matusko: Often when players have a bad board, they think about it a lot and because of that they tend to ruin few next boards, so my advice to them would be to forget mistakes on one board, and play every board like it's their first one.

Interviewer: Thank you Mr. Matusko, I hope you'll come to the tournament next year, and that the Pula Bridge Festival will become a tradition for you.

Matusko: I will surely come, and as I have already said I will bring my family too, after all it is a great vacation spot.

And with that my interviews for this year are done, I hope you all enjoyed them. I have certainly been trying to find some interesting people to talk to, and will continue to do so in the coming years. See you all next year, who knows maybe you will be my next victim.☺ Bye till next time

In the closed room, Costin Mindruta opened the South hand with 2♥: hearts and another. Alex Hydes was more concerned with high card points than length, so he passed. Dan Voinescu in North started an investigation, and Richard Probst had high cards as well as length, so he introduced clubs. After Costin had reluctantly admitted to his diamond suit, Dan went to the small slam. Richard liked a spade lead, so he doubled. Alex had no trouble in knowing what the double was for, but Richard's delight at this rapidly turned into despair. 13 tricks to the Romanians, for +1190.

And yet the deal would cost the Romano-Estonian combination 5 IMPs, because in the open room, Ben Handley-Pritchard had no wish (or tool) to open the South hand. West did fall in love with his eight-card suit, and after Tom Townsend converted his partner's double, he was in the not unenviable position of being able to lead fourth highest from his longest, with the Jack of trumps. 4 tricks was all that declarer managed, -1400.

"This was the most amusing hand I've played in the last few years!" was Richard's final comment.

The shark side...

In bridge we can often see life in all its aspects... and we can like it, or not, often depending on the results. In the **mixed** team I happened to be playing with a **women**, and if you don't understand why I'm telling you TWICE the same thing you must wait till the end of this story...

I had KJ976 AJ9 102 A32, all Vul, ops always silent, first to speak and I opened 1 spade, 2 diamonds from my p, 2NT by me, 3 spades by her. We play 2 over 1 GF, and 3 spades was really slam encouraging... so I couldn't prevent myself from bidding 4 clubs. Next bids were 4 diamonds by her, and 4 hearts by me. **First time I showed a control in hearts.** 4NT by her, and 5 spades by me: 2 aces and the king of trumps. So, apparently, with such a high answer, it was near sure my partner knew this was the **second time I showed a control in hearts.**

Over 5 spades, I heard 6 diamonds. Grunt, I think this is definitely to play... with not such goods spades but really goods diamonds... a hand like Axx Kxx AKJ987 x. But just the hand before she told me... "I'm tired... really tired... **I don't want to bid**, play, defend, **think anymore**...pls... pls try hard to play... it's last board"... so, excluding this bid to be to play, it was made for playing seven spades... Anyway, a women admitting **she doesn't want to think**, is rare. It's the truth, but it's rare. I had to make something in exchange...

So, after long thought, I bid 6 spades... but a few moments later 2 horrible things happened: she bids 7 spades while opps, **always silent** till now, suddenly start **talking** "DIRECTORSSSS"... because of the delay in the 6 spade bid.

Now you know what I was thinking about... but at the table it wasn't so clear to everyone...And, over 6 diamonds, the only "in between" encouraging bid was 6 hearts... but at the table I couldn't really think that she wanted me for **third time to show a control in hearts.**

Directors come... also from surrounding tournaments... They told me to play...

♠ A Q 10
♥ K Q 8 7
♦ A K J 3

Well... definitely a good choice: I can go down in 7 spades OR make it having probably the score corrected in 6 spades plus one. Grunt.

Lead was a spade. Main approach were: to play for a diamond ruff ... sometimes the queen of diamonds is second or third... or to play for the queen of diamond well placed.

I obviously tested if diamonds were 6/1, with Queen alone, and played the hand to have max informations... so discovering diamonds were 4/3 with 4 on my left.

I went down because that queen was third on my right, but my p having seen there was a winning line started fighting with me...Being a clown fish, and not a shark, I had some problems...

She admitted I was right some mornings later... but her admission became really astonishing... "Well... maybe I didn't bid correctly... if you want I leave the team...".

I hadn't the courage to tell her mixed team was finished the day before... **And this, definitely, was fourth time my heart showed a control...**

P.S. Technical players would have surely bid to the best contract of 7 hearts, easy to make with 5 spades, 4 hearts, 2 diamonds and a diamond ruff, and one club. Any of these guys free for the OPEN team match???

PICKING A SLAM

Until now you know that I enjoy looking to things from slightly different angle. Tonight I run into a board that qualifies.

Well, it's another touch-and-go slam deal, and don't ask me to calculate is it really worthwhile to bid it. It is late hour so my calculations would be barely reliable. But it's worth noting that missing cards are placed quite friendly so any slam should make on any reasonable line of play.

With both red queens well placed, 6NT or 6♣ will roll home easily, and even splits in both red suits will decidedly benefit 6♥ or 6♦, should it happen to be your choice. So if you bid it up to slam level, this time it seems you will land on your feet?

Well, not my partner and me! We are capable of producing deeply scientific sequence that will include elaborate pick-a-slam bid. This device will unerringly enable us to play only slam that is not making, i.e. 6♣!

If only I was warned in advance that this convention might be used to pick only slam that is not making ☹
