Chicago pair takes NAP Flight A title

David Yang and Xiaodong Shi came from the middle of the pack with a monster final session to win the Baldwin Flight A North American Pairs. The duo stood 19th after the first day of qualifying play (28 pairs qualified for the final). They scored a 51.48% in the first final to move up to 14th. Their second final session was 69.78%.

"We made a lot of good bidding decisions," said Yang, when asked about their huge score in the evening.

Yang won this event in Pittsburgh in 2005. It was the first NABC title for Shi. "I'm really exited," he said. "Until now, all my friends have won something except for me."

Yang is a professor of electronics at the University of Illinois at Chicago. Shi is a computer engineer for a company that does software work for cars dot com.

Yang is originally from Taiwan and Shi from Shanghai, China. The pair met playing bridge in Chicago, and have played together for 10 years. "We developed our partnership by practice on the Internet," said Shi.

In second place are Chuck Said of Nashville and

David Seibert of Little Rock AR. They were leading going into the final session, but couldn't quite hold off the winners.

The winners scored 433.27 matchpoints (counting carryover), and the second-place pair had 410.16 with 13 being top.

Nickell, Passell elected to Hall of Fame

Nick Nickell and Mike Passell, two of North America's top players, have been elected to the ACBL Bridge Hall of Fame. Induction ceremonies will take place during the 2008 Summer NABC in Las Vegas.


Nickell is president and CEO of Kelso & Co., a New York City firm specializing in private equity investing. He is a three-time winner of the Bermuda Bowl and has 17 North American championships to his credit, including nine wins in the

Spingold Knockout Teams. He is an ACBL Grand Life Master and a World Grand Master in World Bridge Federation rankings.

Nickell is also a former winner of the Cavendish Invitational Pairs and received the Sidney Lazard Jr. Sportsmanship Award for 2005.

Passell, who lives in Las Vegas, is a full-time player and Bermuda Bowl champion (1979) with 21 North American championships to his credit.

With Paul Soloway's death last year, Passell became ACBL's top living



Passell won the McKenney trophy in 1976 and has been the leading masterpoint winner at NABCs on three occasions. He is an ACBL Grand Life Master and a WBF World Grand Master.

NABC sponsor led by generous player

When the local staff of the Detroit NABC set out to find a sponsor for this year's Spring NABC, they had the good fortune to encounter Peter Karmanos Jr., the president and CEO of the Detroit-based Compuware Corporation, a world-class developer of business software. Karmanos, a veteran rubber bridge player, agreed to give the tournament organizers \$50,000. The

Detroit staff is using the money for food, entertainment and transportation at the NABC.

Karmanos is no stranger to philanthropic endeavors, however. When his first wife, Barbara, died of breast cancer at an early age, he gave a very substantial gift to the Detroit Medical Center for cancer research: The Barbara Karmanos Cancer Institute (KCI) was born.

At yesterday's opening ceremony for the Spring NABC, held in the towering lobby of Compuware headquarters in downtown Detroit, the ACBL

Charity Foundation honored Karmanos and the KCI with a \$5000 donation. Karmanos accepted the gift with his son Nick Karmanos, the vice president of development for KCI.

But the crowd of players and interested onlookers who attended the ceremony were there to see an advertised match featuring Karmanos, playing with ACBL chief Jay Baum, against multiple world champion and bridge columnist Bobby Wolff and expert partner and ACBL President Dan Morse. The four-board contest was scored in board-a-match format. The four deals had been played earlier in the week by local experts and new NABC Swiss Teams champions L.W. Melander and Rick Kaye (the teammates of Karmanos and Baum) against tournament co-chair and ACBL Board member William Arlinghaus and Lewis Walker, president of Lawrence Technological University (the teammates of Wolff and Morse).

As the crowd looked at hand records which showed the full deal and the results from the other table, they watched as Karmanos and Baum prevailed in the replay, winning the match 2.5 to 1.5.

Karmanos will visit the tournament later this week to play in his first-ever duplicate game.

JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

Welcome to the world

Over the next 10 days, you will have a chance to read the Daily Bulletins, and you will see reflected much of the world of bridge — from the giddiest heights of top-level competition in the national events, to great rivalry in the regionally rated events and 0-299 events that are available every session.

There are so many events to choose from, it can be daunting to try to decide where and when to play. Use the Daily Bulletin for lots of information — the schedule for today and tomorrow, articles on the game itself, outstanding (or infamous) plays by top experts in the game, speakers programs and free lessons, non-bridge special events and the hospitality offered by our Detroit hosts.

The Daily Bulletin uses the same format for each printing: What you find today will tell you where to look as the tournament continues. You will find Special Events highlighted on page 2. The back page will show today's schedule of events. Just inside the back, you will find the schedule for the next day.

Leaf through the Bulletin and you will also see ads for bridge products and events, even the occasional coupons for goodies.

How should you decide in what events to play? The national events can usually be identified by the number of sessions: they're at least four and up to six for pairs. These are events for experienced players. Most newcomers are not ready for that level of competition.

Some events are labeled for specific qualifications, such as the Life Master Pairs.

You will find, though, that you may play in any single-session event. Almost all of the 299er events are one session, offering red points to winners. You can choose to play in the 299er games at 9 a.m., 1 p.m. or 7:30 p.m. Look, too, for the free speakers programs in the IN area 45

minutes before the afternoon and evening games.

If you are looking for gold points, you won't find them in most single-session events.

The exception is the side game series. You can win gold for a section top in a side game series if you play at least one other session in that same series. You also get gold points for overall awards in each side game series if you play more than one session.

These events are stratified like the open games, so C is 0-750, a much higher ceiling than you'll enjoy in the 299er games. In effect, the series is a two-session event, but you get to choose which two sessions you play — and you don't have to play both sessions with the same partner.

You do have to be careful to make sure that both sessions are in the same series — the series are named, which helps, but make sure you check with a director or the information desk if you have any questions about the series schedule. If you do play in only one session of a series, you get any points you earn as red points.

Make sure you register. The registration packet will have goodies, a schedule, lots of information about local sights and restaurants.

You can expand your bridge world here at the NABC. Welcome!

Opening lead: *A.

Bidding commentary: South adds two extra points for a five-card major in response to a takeout double. In addition, the $\forall K$ is worth extra facing presumed heart length and strength. On the other hand, both minor-suit jacks should be discounted. When the smoke clears, South logs in with 10 revalued points and makes a non-forcing jump to $2 \spadesuit$, showing 9-11. North's raise to $3 \spadesuit$ is invitational, and South decides to go for it with his skewered distribution.


Defensive commentary: West cashes three clubs and shifts to the \blacklozenge K.

Play commentary: Once South sees that West has exactly three clubs, South knows that West

must have a balanced hand (anytime a player opens with a three-card minor, the hand must be balanced) and did not open 1NT. Why? West was either too strong (18-19 high-card points) or too weak (12-14 HCP). South sees 24 HCP between his hand and dummy, so West can't have 16 and not open 1NT. West has shown 9 HCP in clubs and presumably 5 in diamonds for 14 HCP. Ergo, East has the ♥Q. South plays accordingly and comes home a winner.

When opener is known to have opened 1♣ or 1♦ with a three-card suit, opener must have a balanced hand with either 12-14 HCP or 18-19 HCP. With 15-17, the opening bid would be 1NT, and with 20-21, 2NT. Declarer uses these numbers to guide him in the play.

Baldwin NAP-A winners

Play in the Baldwin North American Pairs, Flight A —- a grassroots event that began last summer at the local club level —- began Wednesday.

Qualifiers at the club level advanced to unit competition and those qualifiers advanced to district finals. Three pairs from each district —- more, depending upon attendance —- qualified for the North American final.

Winners will have their names inscribed on the Baldwin Memorial Trophy and will also receive certificates of recognition.

The trophy is presented in memory of Col. Russell J. Baldwin (1889-1969), U.S. Army officer and expert on tournament procedure who was ACBL Honorary Member of the Year in 1943.

Baldwin was active as an organizer from the earliest days of contract bridge. He became a director of the American Bridge League and its treasurer shortly after its founding in 1927. He was a member of the ACBL Laws Commission and primarily responsible for the first Duplicate Code issued in 1935.

Baldwin was active as a tournament director from 1927 until 1941. After service in World War II, he was ACBL business manager from 1946 until 1951.

He was recalled to military serve at the outbreak of the Korean War and retired from the U.S. Army in 1957. He rejoined ACBL in 1958 and was in charge of tournament scheduling until his retirement in 1963.

Tom Gardner: One for Bridge

Learning bridge at the young age of 8, Tom started a life-long avocation of teaching bridge with his younger sister as his first student. Bridge took a back seat while he pursued career and family life. He was proud to have played bridge with five generations of his family: grandmother, parents, sister, wife, daughters and grandchildren.

When Tom retired, he traveled to NABC and regional tournaments winning numerous events. He was not only admired as a skillful player but for his winning smile and gracious manner at the table. He was drawn to sharing his knowledge of the game with less experienced players, knowing that if players improved their techniques, their enjoyment would also increase. He started a weekly duplicate game where he could use the room for free lessons. Every week for more than 15 years, he taught the lesson and constructed a set of pre-made hands that demonstrated important declarer or defensive plays. A finesse would be the last choice of plays so the player needed to look for a better than 50% line of play. These hands were affectionately called "Tom Hands." He later developed a method teaching newer players with "Tommy

Tom was named the Goodwill Member of the Year in 1996. Tom served many years on the ACBL Board of Governors and three times on the ACBL Board of Directors filling the terms of the elected director. In his last term, he worked tirelessly to garner local enthusiasm and ACBL board approval for hosting an NABC in Detroit. Tom died in January 2007, but he shared in the excitement as plans for the Spring 2008 tournament took form. Tom will be long remembered for his kindness and generosity to everyone even when

they did not play bridge.

Art Price was a fixture in the Ann Arbor bridge community from the end of WWII until his passing in 1973, earning him the moniker of "Mr. Bridge." He ran several bridge games in Ann Arbor including the Friday night duplicate bridge game at the University of Michigan Student Union. It was at that bridge game that hundreds of bridge players were introduced to the wonderful world of duplicate bridge. Among those who passed through Ann Arbor during this period were future bridge superstars such as Zeke Jabbour, Chuck Burger, Chuck Said, Jacqui Mitchell, and Amalya Kearse to name just a few. In addition to Art's directing, mentoring and teaching of bridge, he was also an accomplished player. He won numerous regional events, but his biggest success came when he and longtime friend and partner, Dick Lawrence, won the 1968 National Men's Pairs in Seattle.

Dick Lawrence was born and raised in New York City. In the Thirties and Forties, he and his wife Barbara were members of the Cavendish Club. It was here that Dick honed his bridge skills against the elite players of the game. In the mid-1950s, Dick and his family moved to Ann Arbor and opened a clothing store. He quickly established himself in the bridge community. When his wife became ill in 1962, Dick sold his business and retired to spend time with her. After the passing of his wife, he was able to travel to tournaments. He won the 1964 Mixed Pairs in Toronto and the 1968 Men's Pairs in Seattle. Dick later returned to work for another 15 years. He continued to play bridge locally until he was in his nineties. Dick was active in the Ann Arbor bridge scene for 40 years.

Alan "Skip" Castle loved bridge and encouraged everyone he knew to learn how to play. His love of teaching was a gift and together with his love of the game, he was able to pass on his passion for bridge to others. He regularly took new players as partners, not as a professional teacher, but just to help launch them into the world of duplicate bridge.

He moved to Michigan in the late Fifties and played bridge when he was in his twenties. He played only occasionally for a few years and then stopped altogether until he was on a cruise with his wife, Heidi, in 2002. They discovered a bridge class onboard, and he was hooked again. He was soon playing three to four times a week, and he also directed a game in Royal Oak MI.

Alan, who was also active in community theater, died in 2006.

Long-time Detroit-area player "Three-No-Joe" Garcia was known as one who would bid the "cheap game" with any possible (or, sometimes, impossible) combination of 13 cards. Beyond that, however, he helped many beginning players who have gone on to considerable success. With his combination of teaching, pleading, cajoling and sometimes bullying, he made a lasting impression on those he played with. Sometimes they fumed over his ways, but they always came back for more. He was fun to play with. When he went "down nine," in 2006, bridge players from throughout the Metro Detroit area came out to say a final farewell. His influence, however, continues to be felt in the Detroit bridge community. Sponsored by Sally Ann & Terry T. Brown.

At this and future North American championships, ACBL will be monitoring NABC+ events with visible, real-time cameras. The images will be recorded and will be available for later official inspection and review.

By general monitoring of the session and participants' behavior, ACBL has another source of

information that may be useful in determining facts and settling issues arising from some types of ethical and behavioral complaints or actions. This procedure is intended to assure everyone that the playing field is level and that misbehavior will not be tolerated.
