"How much money can you win?"

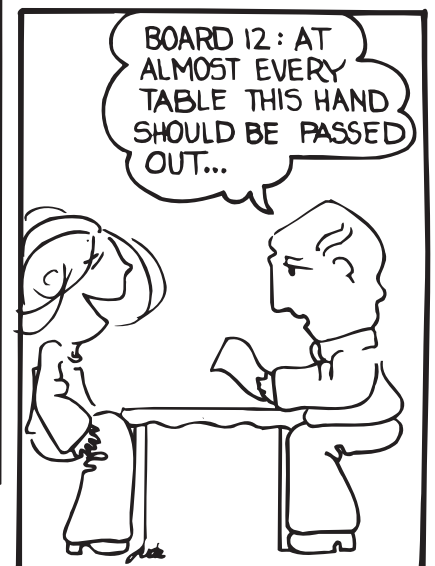
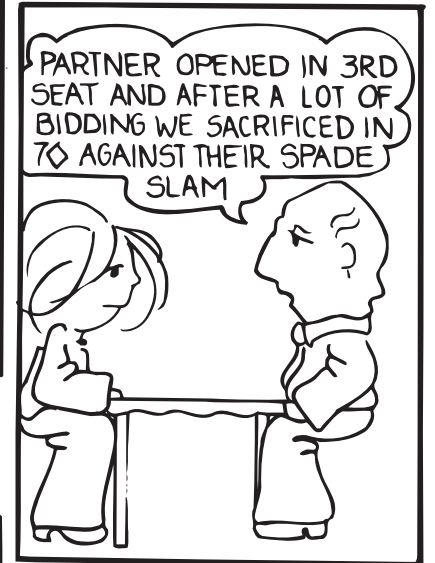
"Tenna, we don't play for money. We play for points. Masterpoints."

Thinking bridge

Placing the cards

Dlr: South ♠ K J 8 5

Opening lead: ♥7.

Bidding commentary: As North, it is generally not a good idea to use Stayman with a flat hand. In this case, even though you have missed a 4-4 spade fit, 3NT is a better contract because both your hand and partner's hand have the same distribution.

Defensive commentary: West makes a normal fourth-highest lead. East wins the ♥A and returns the ♥10. As West, you can follow with the ♥6 to show a five-card suit or you can make

an even stronger play, the ♥J. This play informs partner that the jack is your highest remaining equal informing partner that declarer has the ♥Q.

Play commentary: As South, win the ♥K at trick two, higher equal for deceptive purposes. As it happens, you can even misguess the ♠Q and take nine tricks, but if you were in a contract of 4♠, you would have to find the ♠Q to make your contract. Also, if you are playing in a tournament where overtricks are the heart and soul of the game, finding the ♠Q will give you a good score, perhaps a near top. There is a clue.

West appears to have started with five hearts and eight "other cards." East has two hearts and 11 other cards. Play the defender who has more "other cards" (East) for the missing queen.

Play commentary #2: As South, if you want to further confirm your "other cards" count, it can't hurt to cash three rounds of clubs. As it happens, both follow to three rounds of clubs so you don't get any more information. Stick with plan A and play East for the ♠Q.

Karen's excellent text adventure

The following interview appeared recently in the *Champaign-Urbana News-Gazette*.

Staff writer Paul Klee might be the fastest text messenger in the Midwest. FWIW*, each Wednesday we'll utilize his GR8 skill to interview a text-savvy personality. THX to Parkland College instructor **Karen Walker**, a national champion bridge player who also is a bridge columnist and game director at Bridge at Ginger Creek.

*(for what it's worth).

Since you're the national champion here, what should the uneducated crowd (me) know about bridge?

It's the world's most popular and challenging card game, and one of the best activities for improving mental fitness. It's also humbling and addictive, and is probably the real reason that Bill Gates is retiring from Microsoft.

You think Bill Gates would Text with Klee? Maybe if we offered him a game at the Ginger Creek Bridge Club?

You might have to offer him a more exotic venue – and fly in Warren Buffett to be his partner – but Gates is enough of a bridge nut that he might take you up on it.

Any other famous types stricken with the bridge bug?

Lots. Since we're on the sports page: Former Illinois basketball coach Lou Henson, Martina Navratilova, Wilt Chamberlain, Tim McCarver – plus most players in the Phillies clubhouse when McCarver was there.

So is bridge really a sport? Poker's on ESPN, you know.

So is the Scripps Spelling Bee, and bridge is a lot more exciting than that. We call it a "mind sport." Like athletic sports, bridge emphasizes teamwork, ethics and sportsmanship. Can't say that about poker.

You're a bridge game "director," like a bridge referee. If I look at someone else's cards, is there a penalty box?

There's a scoring or trick penalty if you break a rule. Most bridge players would prefer the penalty box, though.

Who would make a better bridge player: (Illinois football coach) Ron Zook or (Illinois basketball coach) Bruce Weber?

Ron Zook. I don't think Bruce could sit still for long enough to finish a bridge hand, even though that's only about five minutes.

How many competitive bridge clubs do we have in C-U? How many champions? And who's the top-rated player in town?

There's just one duplicate bridge club, but we have several games a week, plus a week-long tournament every Memorial Day. There are two national champions here – me and Lynne Feldman – and we're about equal in bridge rankings.

More of a thrill: Winning a national championship in bridge, taking Bill Gates' money at the bridge table, or texting with Klee?

Texting with Klee is right up there, but it has to be the national championship, since that took me 30 years. It will be a lot longer than that before I could talk Bill Gates into a money bridge game.

Zero Tolerance What we can learn from other sports

There was a pause at the end of the bidding while the East and West players left the table and were replaced by two teammates. "They're bringing on their defense players," explained Aileen. "They've even got a guy who comes on only to lead against Lightner doubles."

South's reaction to dummy was one of disappointment; he could see 13 tricks – five hearts, five clubs and three spades. He ruffed the diamond lead in hand, crossed to the ♥ K and drew a second round of trumps, East discarding a club. Declarer paused for a moment. If he cashed the ♥ J next, there would be no convenient way back to his hand to draw West's last trump. He soon came up with the answer. He unblocked the ♣ A and led the ♥ J from dummy, playing the ace from hand. Now he ran the clubs; West could ruff in with his master trump when he wished, but declarer would make the rest of the tricks.

South was delighted with himself. "Did you see that?" he exclaimed. "What a great piece of overtaking! Andretti would have been proud!"

He dashed off to the bar and was soon spraying champagne over everyone within a 10-yard radius. The cheer-leaders weren't too happy to have their outfits soaked, but it did have the advantage of breaking up the fight between two of the soccer players about who would get to swap shirts with the blonde tennis player.

I left in a hurry. If I was lucky I could just make it back to civilization and the evening duplicate at my club.

E.B.K. can still play great

Eddie Kantar does not compete in serious tournament bridge any longer, but he can still play a really great game. He has a terrific analytical mind that sees opportunities most players would miss.

On Saturday evening, he and I played for a couple of hours against Linda and Ray Lee, of Master Point Press fame. This was my favorite deal from the session.

I will describe how the play went. You decide how many excellent plays were found and how many errors.

Kantar led the ♥ 2. I won the trick with my ♥ A and shifted to the ♠ 9, zero or two higher. West took South's jack with his ace, returned the ♠ 8, which held the trick, and played his remaining spade.

After throwing a club from the dummy, declarer won with her ♠ K, cashed the ♦ A and continued with the ♦ Q, which held. Now she led a low heart toward the dummy, West putting in his jack. South won with the king on the dummy, cashed the ♥ 10 and took her three club tricks, but conceded the rest to go down one.

What are your thoughts?

I am sure you spotted the best play: Eddie's entry-killing ♥ J at trick seven. Without that, declarer would have finessed dummy's ♥ 10 and established the diamonds. After Eddie's play, the contract was unmakeable.

To stop West from finding this great play, as Eddie mentioned, South should have dumped her ♥ Q under my ace at trick one. However, if I had returned a heart, that would have removed a dummy entry while the diamonds were still blocked.

The simplest way to beat the contract was for me not to win trick one. However, that would not have been so clever if declarer could have taken the next eight tricks in the minors when partner had ♠ A-J-x-x.

Did you see, though, that South could still have made her contract after winning with the ♠ K?

Declarer takes (two or) three club tricks (discarding a diamond from the dummy), then leads her low heart. West puts up his jack, but South wins in the dummy and plays a diamond, jettisoning her ♥ Q. West has to concede the last two tricks to the dummy.

To stop this, after West won the third trick with his ♠ 8, he had to go back to hearts to get one of the entries out of the dummy. So, not even Eddie escaped unscathed from this deal!

Facts: The director was called after East—West had left the table. East—West had fourth-suit forcing on their convention cards. East thought 2♠ over 1♥ would be fourth-suit forcing, but West thought 1♠ was fourth-suit forcing. West did not inform North—South that there was a failure to Alert before the opening lead was faced.

Director's ruling: West had intended his bid of 1♠ to be conventional and artificial. He did not inform his opponents of the failure to Alert after the auction and before the opening lead. It was judged that had West informed his opponents prior to the opening lead that South would be likely to lead a spade. It also was judged that with a spade lead, East was unlikely to make five. Therefore, in accordance with Laws 75D2, 40C and 12C2, the result was adjusted for both sides to 4♥ by East making four, E—W plus 420.

The appeal: North—South and East appeared at the hearing. According to them, East—West left the table and North—South called the director before or at the beginning of the next round. East—West were not informed until roughly two hours later. East—West did not make a statement to the director until then.

East stated that it seemed unfair that after he had played the hand double-dummy that his result was taken away. And, if it took two hours for the director to rule, something must be wrong or maybe they weren't sure.

The decision: West's failure to inform his opponents that there was a failure to Alert was an infraction. If West had complied with the law (*i.e.* announced the failure to Alert), it would have been discovered that his 1♠ call was intended to be conventional and artificial. With this information, some players would lead a spade and some would lead a heart. Thinking that 1♠ was natural, no one would lead a spade. Because a spade is more successful than a heart, North—South were damaged, and an adjustment was in order. Therefore, the committee upheld the director's adjustment for both sides of 4♥ by East making four, East—West plus 420.

The more difficult decision was whether or not to award an appeal without merit warning (AWMW). On the face of it, the Laws and bridge judgment are clear enough that this case itself has

no merit. It occurred during the first round and a movement snafu had the directors rather busy. As a result, East—West never heard that the director was called or that there was a ruling until near the end of the session. This lack of communication made East—West uncertain that this was a fairly simple ruling of law and made the whole thing seem unfair. Had there been timely notification and communication, the committee would have decided that there was no merit to the appeal.

The infraction by West, however, was blatant and unacceptable for a player of West's experience. The committee felt that it wanted to impress upon West not to abdicate his responsibility in the future and, therefore, assessed a token procedural penalty of one-tenth of a board. Law 90 encourages directors and committees to award a PP for errors in procedure that require adjusted scores to be awarded.

Facts: Before the opening lead, East explained that 2♣ showed one or two majors. This was determined to be the actual agreement.

Director's ruling: The unauthorized information from the misexplanation demonstrably suggested a pass by East, but 3♠ was judged to be a logical alternative. Therefore, in accordance with Law 16A2 and Law 12C2, the result was adjusted to 3♠ by East down two, East—West minus 200.

The appeal: East—West, the appealing side, stated that in their system, 2♦ shows a preference for hearts and 2♥ prefers spades, 2♠ and 3♥ are at least five-card suits with tolerance for partner to correct. Therefore, 3♥ had to be a decent contract. Also, the opponents misdefended 3♥. If they had switched to trumps this would be minus 300.

The decision: There clearly was UI. The appealing pair had no documentation of their agreement, and without such an agreement, West could have been expecting partner to pass or correct. The UI demonstrably suggested passing, and 3♠ was a logical alternative. With no evidence of the stated agreement regarding 3♥ the committee could not assume that it was in effect, so they chose to adjust the score. What were the likely and at all probable results had East bid 3♠? If West continued to believe that 2♣ shows both majors then 3♠ would be forcing and the auction would continue. The committee judged that the unusual 3♠ bid would almost certainly wake West up enough that he would recall the actual agreement and pass. As far as the result in 3♠, down one, two, or three were all possible. The committee judged that down two was both the

most favorable result likely for North—South and the most unfavorable result at all probable for East—West.

The committee found that the defense against 3♥ was not of such egregiously poor quality as to deny North—South their right to redress.

The committee adjusted the score for both sides to 3♠ by East—West down two (as the director had), for a score of East—West minus 200.

The committee found that the appeal had substantial merit.

love," Bagley said. "Ken is the hardest-working volunteer I know. He works until the job is done and he makes sure it's done right."

Besides playing, teaching and running tournaments, Monzingo has, since 1982, been the managing editor of the Contract Bridge Forum, which is mailed to 19,000 homes in Districts 17, 21 and 22.

Monzingo, reluctant at first to address the gathering, had no choice once his volunteer medal had been presented by Goodwill Chair Aileen Osofsky.

"I feel blessed to be here," he said, adding that "my blessings have come in twos – I have two children, two grandchildren and two great workers in the Western Conference office. I love the Western Conference."

Monzingo and Bagley were introduced by Jerry Fleming, who represents District 17, the host district for the NABC, on the ACBL Board of Directors. Fleming in ACBL President-elect for 2009.

Said Fleming, "These (tournaments) never happen without a lot of work beforehand and during the tournament. We owe a lot to the volunteers in District 17. This is a great place to be, and it's due to the people."

Osofsky's theme was that "one person can make a difference," and she said one ACBL staffer who has made a huge difference at the NABC is Wendy Sullivan of Meeting Services. She has been stationed in a high-traffic area with an "ask me" sign. Osofsky said she observed Sullivan fielding question after question from members, "and she knew every answer right away."

Another person who has worked hard to make a difference is Al Levy, who represents District 24 on the ACBL board. Osofsky said she only recently learned that Levy started the World Computer Bridge Championships 12 years ago. The event is played yearly and is going on at the Summer NABC this week.

Current ACBL President Dan Morse greeted the group and complimented the organizers of the NABC. "Las Vegas," he said, "what a great place."

The celebration of Monzingo's gifts to bridge were but one part of the Goodwill meeting. Osofsky handed out several certificates for a variety of achievements.

The first was to the family of the late Cmdr. Orion Templeton of Lynchburg VA. Templeton purchased and remodeled the Orion Templeton Senior Center and Duplicate Bridge Club and donated it to the city. He planned for operating expenses to be paid in perpetuity.

The commander died last summer. One of his bridge partners, Gloria Flicker, accepted the certificate for the family. "He loved bridge so much," she said. Flicker said Templeton was playing bridge at the center and "fell asleep with cards in his hands and didn't wake up." He died

Aug. 6 of last year.

Osofsky also presented a certificate to poker expert and bridge player Phil Gordon, who sponsored the sportsmanship trophy for the recently completed Youth NABC in Atlanta.

Gordon remembers his start in bridge in Atlanta and the help and encouragement he received in those days from Patty Tucker, who conceived of the Youth NABC and made it happen.

Gordon said he fully supports Tucker's goal of getting more young people involved in bridge. "We have to do something," he said, "or we're going to run out of opponents."

Next to be honored was Rabbi Leonard Helman, who donated trophies for the Youth NABC and has been a supporter of youth bridge all over the world for years.

Osofsky noted that the Leonard A. Helman Bridge Center will soon be opening in the rabbi's home town of Santa Fe NM.

At the podium, Helman said, "It's been a great joy playing bridge. I appreciate your kindness and friendship."

One of the key moments was the presentation of a certificate to Tucker, who was recognized for her work with Atlanta Junior Bridge and for getting the Youth NABC off the ground.

ACBL Bridge Bulletin Editor Brent Manley, who covered the Youth NABC for his magazine, said it was one of the best tournaments he has ever attended, and he said all ACBL members should be proud of Tucker and what she accomplished.

She noted that the tournament, the first NABC for players 19 and younger, drew 198 players and 210 tables over three and a half days of play.

What Tucker enjoyed most, she said, was seeing the young players make connections the way adult players do. "These kids," she said, "need to play with other kids, and making connections is what it's all about. Let's help these kids continue to be able to play."

The second Youth NABC is schedule to take place alongside the 2009 Summer NABC in Washington DC.

Making it on power

Playing in the Monday evening session of the Stratified Open Pairs, you hold:

♠ A K Q 8 ♥ A K Q ♦ 5 4 3 ♣ A K 9.

You first thought is why don't I hold hands like this playing rubber bridge? There are three passes to you and you open 2♣. Your left-hand opponent doubles (showing clubs) and partner passes. You Alert the pass as showing scattered values and right-hand opponent passes. What would you do?

You may have decided to pass. With all your aces and kings, you may make 2♣ redoubled on power — this would surely be a top. This was likely the thinking of the player who held this hand (deal rotated):

Declarer played the ♥A K Q and Fried ruffed the third round to lead the ♣J. South won that and played the ♠A K Q. Fried ruffed the third round of that suit, drew another round of trumps and led a low diamond to the jack. East—West took the rest of the tricks for down two — plus 1000 for East—West.

This result was a top on the board and helped Fried and Singer finish seventh in Flight B.

was a bridge game in a back room. They played for small stakes, maybe one-fourth of a cent a point, and I quickly saw they were terrible players. That's when I switched from chess."

Zolotow attended Columbia University and was a friend of another bridge player, Steve Altman. Together they traveled to bridge tournaments. After Columbia, Zolotow earned an MBA from New York University.

During his college years, and just after, Zolotow played bridge and backgammon at the famous Mayfair Club in New York City. The legendary Al Roth was the club manager. He set up a weekly IMP game. "The IMP game was handicapped from one to seven," says Zolotow. "I started out as a six handicap and moved down to four."

Zolotow was one of the members responsible for introducing poker to the Mayfair Club. Once they began to offer poker, others were drawn to the club. The list of players who got their start there reads like a who's who of poker. Dan Harrington, Al Krux, Howard Lederer, Jason Lester and Eric Seidel are some of them.

Sometimes events have a strange way of affecting people's lives. Even though he played frequently at the Mayfair Club, Zolotow had a regular job working for Harper Row Publishers. He was passed over for a promotion in a disputed situation. About the same time, he won a backgammon tournament that paid a large cash prize. The two incidents convinced him to quit his job and try something else — sports betting. He and his friends used a computer to study the betting lines before that was fashionable. One time he was arrested — the police thought he was a bookmaker. They left sports bettors alone, but were always after the bookies. "I spent the night in one of the worst jails in New York City," says Zolotow. "The called it 'The Tomb.'"

He was released the next day, but the incident changed his life. He left the New York City area and headed for Las Vegas — he knew gambling was legal there.

Zolotow has two bracelets for wins at the World Series of Poker. He has "cashed" (finished high enough to be in the prize money) in nearly 40 WSOP events — an outstanding record. He is a professional at an online poker site, Full Tilt Poker.

Zolotow enjoys writing about poker. He is a columnist for Card Player magazine. "I like doing it and it keeps my name in lights," he says. "It's rewarding to find different and interesting ways to explain poker to other players."

Besides his success at poker, Zolotow has also done well at bridge. In 2003, he finished fifth in the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams. This event is arguably one of the two or three toughest events on the ACBL's calendar.

Zolotow played with the late Paul Soloway for several years. "As our partnership grew, however, it became harder and harder," he says. "We had 80 pages of notes and I found I was concentrating on our system more than the cards at the table. It was more work than fun."

"I don't play a lot of bridge anymore," he says. "Phil (Gordon) and I are old friends, so we got together to play here. I've quit traveling (for bridge), but I really miss the weekly IMP games we used to have at the Mayfair. I wish they had something like that here (in Las Vegas)."

Even though Zolotow left the New York City area, he still has business interests there. He is part-owner in six bars in New York City — Nice Guy Eddies and Doc Holliday's are two of them.

ACBL bans electronic devices in national events

The ACBL Board of Directors approved a comprehensive ban on electronic devices for all national level events, but not to regional or Intermediate Newcomer contests:

Electronic devices, excluding health related equipment, capable of sending or receiving communication, including but not limited to, headphones, earphones, cellular phones and minicomputers: (1) shall not be allowed in the playing areas, adjacent hallways, restrooms or accessible break areas; and (2) shall not be used during a session.

These restrictions shall apply to all pairs, team members, captains, coaches, recorders and kibitzers and shall apply throughout any actual playing session or segment.

A violation of this policy shall result in a disciplinary penalty of one full board (or 12 IMPs

at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense shall result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team.

Kibitzers violating this policy shall be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the session.

The Summer North American Bridge Championships in Las Vegas will be the first NABC impacted by the new policy.

Participants in the following contests will be reminded not to approach the playing area with a personal electronic device in their possession, even if the device is turned off: all flights of the Grand National Teams, the von Zedtwitz, Bruce and Young Life Master Pairs, the Spingold Knockout Teams, both Mini-Spangolds, the Wagar Women's Knockout Teams, the Truscott/USPC Senior Swiss Teams, the Wernher Open Pairs, the NABC+ Fast Pairs, the Mixed Board-a-Match Teams, the Open Swiss Teams and the National 199er Pairs.
