Additional Conditions of Contest

Pursuant to the provision of Condition L the following additions provisions are added to the conditions of contest of the Open, Women's and Senior Team Championships:

D. Ethics

- Leaving the table during the bidding and play. No player may leave the table during the bidding. Dummy may leave the table after the opening lead has been made with the consent of his screen-mate.
- 6. No "Time Out"

A player may leave the table between hands to go to the lavatory or to get a drink. But no partnership may leave the table together and no partnership may have any discussion during the match except through the screen aperture (between hands) in the presence of their opponents.

Mobile Phones - Spot Checks

Team Captains and Players, Scorers and Kibitzers are reminded that Mobile Phones may not be brought into the playing area and toilets.

In order to ensure that this regulation is strictly adhered to there will be random spot checks of all the members of a team, including the captain and scorer at the start of each match. Teams are asked to co-operate with these spot checks which will include a search of personal belongings.

Mobile phones may be left with Reception for the duration of the match.

In the News

The Gazzetta Di Parma - a snip at Euro 0.88 - will be carrying a daily report on the Championships.

Israel - Lebanon

The Executive Committee recognises that in the current international political situation it is impossible for Lebanon to play against Israel. The Executive Committee also recognises that the Israeli team is ready and willing to play against Lebanon.

In the circumstances Lebanon will not be penalised for not playing against Israel and the two teams will be allotted the following scores for their match:

Israel: 18VP or the average of its score against all other teams, rounded to the nearest half VP, whichever is the greater

Lebanon: the average of its score against all other teams, rounded to the nearest half VP.

The journey of a lifetime in the form of a trip to Bali to contest the 2003 World Championships is the goal for the teams competing in the 2002 European Team Championships.


The French Open Tennis Championships, Formula 1, Wimbledon, The Derby, and the World Cup set June alight in a blaze of sport. The build up to all these great contests seems to last forever, dominating the headlines everywhere. Now comes for us the real highlight, the Premiership and Series A of bridge rolled into one, the toughest challenge of all, the European Team Championships 2002.

The twin questions on everyone's lips are 'Who will win and who will qualify?'

Let's see if we can provide the answers.

Open

With home advantage reigning Champions Italy will take some stopping. They took some time to get into their stride in Tenerife, but still emerged as winners. Boards like this helped them on their way:



East led the queen of hearts but West did not overtake, so the contract was in no danger. When East played a second heart declarer had eleven tricks, +990.

This time East led the jack of hearts, his normal card from his holding and from J10 combinations. West could see the ten, so he overtook and played the two of diamonds. Two ruffs and the ace of clubs meant one down and +200.

It would be a brave man who would bet against another Italian triumph but...

Russia is a real force and they will be hoping to improve on their fourth place in Tenerife. They can certainly handle the

dummy, as this deal demonstrates to perfection:


West led a spade and after winning with the ace declarer led a diamond and put up the queen when West played low. In the other room Versace had ducked, and made his game easily enough when East won and returned the king of diamonds by winning and playing two rounds of trumps. East took the queen and returned the suit. Declare won and played a third round, leaving West on play. On the club return he took the king with the ace and led a low heart. West played low without a flicker and East took the jack with the king and played a club to South's queen.

Declarer had already seen East produce three kings, but he had passed as dealer. Out came the ace of hearts, felling the queen, earning a round of applause from the VuGraph audience.

Russia will surely be one of the qualifiers.

Bulgaria has been making steady progress over the last few years and is likely to be up with the pace – this deal will show you why:





Two Hearts showed clubs so Three Diamonds was fourth suit forcing.


North led the jack of spades and declarer drew trumps and played the ten of clubs to the king and ace. South switched to the three of hearts, but declarer won with the ace and played a heart to the ten. Dummy's hearts took care of the losing diamonds and +980 was worth 11 IMPs.

Poland will be on everyone's list for a top five finish. They can

take any team apart - last time they trounced Italy 57-27.



Zmudzinski felt that facing four trumps he might well make eleven tricks - and right he was. +650 for Poland and 11 IMPs.

Norway will be regarded as 100% certainties to finish in the top five - just as France was to reach stage two of the World Cup - but then the Norwegians are unlikely to be affected by injuries to their squad.

Geir Helgemo is the focus of attention but Tor Helness knows a thing or two, as witness this deal from the 1993 Championships.

Helgemo bid Two Clubs planning to redouble for rescue - but Tor's leap to Four Spades was something of a surprise. West led the king of hearts and East might have overtaken that and returned the suit. When he played low West played a second heart to East's ace. Declarer won the trump switch and drew a second round. He needed three rounds of clubs to survive, so he cashed the ace and king and then played the jack. When West declined to ruff with the master trump it was all over. A heart went from the dummy and another on the queen of clubs as West ruffed one trick too late.

Who else can we expect to be in at the shake up?


Denmark, France and Sweden are never far away, and they all have powerful squads this time. Every tipster should provide a few good outsiders, so watch out for Austria, Belgium, England, Greece, The Netherlands & Spain.

And keep in mind that every team is capable of causing an upset - which is why these are the toughest Championships.

Women


It's a mystery why the Women's Championship is not graced by more teams, but there is no shortage of quality.

England is the holder and can be expected to put up a stout defence of their title. They were in great form in Tenerife, where this deal caught the eye of Alan Truscott and appeared in his column in the New York Times.

West led a diamond and after winning with the ace in dummy declarer cashed the top spades and ruffed a spade. She cashed the ace of clubs to reach this position:



A low trump caught West by surprise. She played low but only after a slight hesitation that told declarer what to do. She put up the jack of clubs and played winning spades and the queen of clubs was the only trick for the defence.


It would not have helped West to go up with the queen but an in tempo play of the four would have given South a chance to go wrong.

Making a slam was rather good as at the other table Five Clubs failed.

West led the jack of hearts, covered all round. Declarer crossed to the ace of diamonds, came back to hand with a trump and cashed the king of diamonds, discarding a heart. Now she gave up a heart. East won and played another heart, forcing

dummy to ruff while West discarded a spade and when declarer played three rounds of spades ruffing low, West overruffed and exited with the queen of clubs to leave declarer with a losing diamond.

Germany will be among the favourites to win the title but they have a habit of starting poorly and last time they had to work hard to secure a medal. However, as reigning Venice Cup Champions they are on everyone's list. Pony Nehmert is just one of their stars. Here she is in action in Malta in 1999.


North's Two Diamonds promised a heart suit and Four Diamonds was a splinter. Hoping to set up a club trick East led the four of clubs. Sabine Auken, playing just a week after the birth of her second son (!) won with the king and drew trumps, taking a couple of diamond ruffs along the way before claiming twelve tricks.

When South denied any key cards in response to the Four No-Trump enquiry Pony Nehmert was sure the king of spades would be with South. Her partner could not have much in the way of high cards so she led the ace of spades. Her partner's nine promised an odd number but North's opening bid told East what she wanted to know. A second spade allowed West to ruff, 17 IMPs for Germany.

France is in great form and may well be the team to beat this

Catherine d'Ovidio is one of their brightest stars. Here she is in action at the recent Mixed championships in Ostend:



After East opened One Spade South came to rest in 3NT. West led the three of spades and when East put in the jack South won with the king.

With eight tricks in sight the obvious thing is to finesse in diamonds through the opening bidder but Catherine realised that she could do better and played off her winning clubs. What could East discard?

She must keep the ace of hearts and four spades and therefore only two diamonds. So, when declarer then played off the


top diamonds the queen fell - not by magic but by skill. Who else will be in the race?

The Netherlands took the silver medals last time and Israel will surely do well and Italy must be a threat playing at home. What I hear you say, no mention of mighty Austria? They are missing three of their stars, so they, along with Russia and Sweden are my dark horses.

Seniors

This is going to be a tough event, featuring as it does some outstanding players.

England must be in with a chance, and they include the redoubtable John Collings, who won a silver medal in the 1981 Championships. Here is a famous deal from that event:

Declarer won the ten of clubs lead and cashed the ace and queen of spades before playing the king of diamonds. He only needed diamonds to be 5-1, but West was able to ruff and cash the ace of hearts.



Paul Hackett and John Collings were playing Walpurgis Club, a weird system that only they understood. Colling's initial pass promised 9-12 points and although he refused to co operate in North's initial slam investigation of Three Spades, he dutifully showed his assets in response to his partner's subsequent efforts.

West led the jack of clubs and declarer won and cashed the ace of spades. Now Collings played a heart and when East played low he was able to claim his contract, as he could not be prevented from ruffing a heart high in dummy. It was enough to win Collings the Bols Brilliancy prize in 1981

France has a terrific team and is sure to do well. Two of their stars were on the French team that won the Olympiad here in

Salsomaggiore in 1992.



Six Clubs is clearly the top spot as you may be able to cope with various bad breaks. However it is not so easy to get there as this effort demonstrates:

Declarer was lucky to find this had any play at all - just reverse East's holdings in the minor suits - and although he located the queen of clubs the 4-2 heart break meant he had to go one down.

When West started with Two Diamonds East used a series of relays to discover his partner was 5-4-0-4 with bad clubs. However, since the minimum holding West was permitted to have had to include the $\clubsuit 10$ it was a simple matter for East to choose the best contract. On the lead of the eight of hearts declarer won and took a winning view in clubs for +1390.

With Israel, Poland and Italy all having strong sides it is anyone's guess who will mount the rostrum. The chances of Denmark, Germany and Sweden should not be discounted.

So, there you have it. An all too brief guide to just some of the mighty teams and individuals that make up the greatest bridge show on earth.
