It was no surprise to see this match end in an honourable Grand Masters' draw.

Things were happening till very late on Friday night in the other group. Before round 5, four teams could still qualify as only 9 V.P. separated them. Bamberg and Mragowia were 6 and 5 V.P. ahead of Allegra and three more ahead of EYKT. When the smoke cleared, Allegra had easily beaten Mragowia 22-8 to go through. In the other match, EYKT looked well on their way to qualify just four boards from the end, but as we all know, Germans never give up. Four boards later the result of the match had turned out to be a draw, more than enough to see Bamberg into the semis but just not enough to keep them at the top of Group B.



## Round Robin Round 2

The Iceland team had suffered the smallest of losses in their first-round encounter with the Poles (14-16) whereas Allegra had kicked off in great style, winning by 25-2. The Turin team were no doubt hoping to keep up that pace whereas the EYKT team realised that they had to register a good result in this match to keep their chances of qualification alive. Looking at the final outcome of their match, an exact tie at 49 all, I wonder which team was most pleased with this result...

The match started well for Allegra who already led 2-0 when board 3 arrived to substantially increase this lead:

North definitely could consider himself unlucky when he led the  $\bigstar$ K only to find out that his partner did not hold a single spade honour at all. Even after this unfortunate lead the contract was not home at all. Duboin won the  $\bigstar$ A and cashed his club tricks, no doubt very pleased to see them break 3-3. On the run of the clubs, South had discarded his low diamond which proved costly a few tricks later. After the clubs, a heart from dummy went to declarer's queen and next came the  $\Diamond$ J. North covered (would you have played low?), dummy ducked and South won the trick. Now, Duboin could win the spade return and finesse against the  $\Diamond$ 10 for his contract and an automatic overtrick as well. Allegra a terrific +630.



On a spade lead from south declarer decided not to put all his money on the lucky club break but to go after the diamonds first. This enabled the defence to clear the spades with the  $\heartsuit$ A still in South as an entry to cash the spade winners. Down two. Allegra another +200 and 13 Imps.

EYKT had recouped 5 Imps of their 15-imp deficit when a not too grand slam arrived:

No problem. EYKT +50 and 14 Imps back to go into the lead.

Please note that the grand depends only on the trump position and thus had reasonable chances, only just below the required odds for a grand.

Ferraro decided to open INT on his hand, in spite of the six-card diamond suit. In their match against Parioli the English showed how to deal with this sort of liberties.

West did his best with a nuisance 24 opening but when Nunes bid 4 the Italians looked well on their way towards the small slam until Fantoni resigned in 50. Parioli +420.

24 showed clubs and the rest was quantitative and natural. As the diamond safety play is available now, 6 NT clearly is the best contract. England +990 and 14 Imps to them.

Back now to the Allegra match.

This seems the correct contract to be in but it could not be handled once the spades broke 4-1. Declarer has to establish his side tricks first before running the spades and squeezing himself. One down, EYKT +50.

After a harmless start of the auction suddenly an explosion followed. As so often, the last double was the one that really hurt, though even losing 300 with 3NT not on would not have been a good result for Allegra.

As it was, Ferraro went down four, EYKT +800 to lead by 18 now.

On the next board, a number of declarers showed their fine card-reading sense:

Baldursson led the  $\clubsuit$ Q which was allowed to hold. He exited with a diamond to dummy's blank king and Duboin led a spade, the king winning. His next move was a low club. When North did not play an honour, dummy's eight was inserted to bring down the ace. Jonsson continued a diamond, but Duboin was in full control. He cashed two top diamonds and concede a diamond to North who exited with a heart. In dummy for the last time, Duboin now had no option but to cash the  $\clubsuit$ K and play a spade to the queen. As North had not established his clubs he could not hold the  $\bigstar$ A any more, Duboin must have thought. Allegra +400.

On Vugraph, Versace played this hand in exactly the same way...and he was not the only other one.

Declaring only INT, Armannsson could afford to cover the  $\clubsuit Q$  lead with the king. South won the ace and continued a diamond so the contract was never in danger. EYKT +120 but a loss of 7 Imps. Their lead now: 34-23

With the score at 36-23, we went into the final quarter of the match, and an exciting finale it was:

Jonsson must have had other ideas about Baldursson's INT rebid but it was Bocchi who had the last word. The defence cashed two spades before taking their diamond ruff. After that, a club and a trump still had to be lost for down three, +500 to Allegra.

This might not have been a bad result had Armansson made his vulnerable game at the other table...



South led the  $\clubsuit K$  which was allowed to hold and switched to a trump won in dummy. A diamond to the ace was followed by a heart, South winning his ace. Declarer now won the club return, ruffed a diamond in dummy, threw his club loser on the  $\heartsuit K$ and ruffed a club, thus establishing dummy's  $13^{th}$ club as a winner.

Things had developed well for declarer but his problem was that he had not too many trumps left. He had made six tricks at this point but had only two trumps left in either hand. So there was no way to both draw one round of trumps and scoring enough ruffs. Down two. Allegra +200 and 12 Imps back to reduce the deficit to just the odd Imp.

Two boards later, the Italians struck another blow:

A normal contract and a normal diamond lead by West. Jonsson won the  $\Diamond A$  and returned a low diamond but west hopped up with his jack and continued the  $\bigstar$ J. Declarer won the king, cashed the  $\Diamond K$ and played a spade, seeing the bad break. The  $\heartsuit Q$ was taken by East's ace and the low heart return was ducked to West's  $\heartsuit I0$ . Duboin now could easily lock declarer in dummy by returning a diamond. As declarer could not cash a spade without giving up any chance of making, he had to play a club immediately. This enabled West to not only score two clubs, but a diamond as well. Down three, Allegra +300.

2NT asked for the minor after the two-suited opening bid.

At this table, North was the declarer and East led the  $\clubsuit3$ . When dummy's six forced West's jack, declarer was in a good position. He cashed his top diamonds, East throwing the  $\clubsuit9$  (!?) and now followed this with the  $\clubsuitQ$  to West's king.


The rest was easy enough. Allegra +630 and 14 Imps to lead by 13 with two boards to go.

Board 19 was a push when both Jonsson and Vivaldi went down in heart contracts. The interesting difference was that Jonsson was in  $4^{\circ}$  and Vivaldi in  $6^{\circ}$ ...



Over now to the next board, another slam:

For once, the great Italian school of slam bidding did not lead to the optimum result on this board. Allegra +680.

According to the explanations given, 3NT showed six spades and a heart void and 40 confirmed three diamonds and four clubs. Knowing all this, Jorgensen had an easy raise to slam.

As the trumps were 2-2 with North holding the jack, there only were successful lines of play available. Declarer ruffed the third club low in dummy and saw South discarding. From there, he went on cross-ruff lines, counting his 1430 blessings when nobody could overruff at any time.

As the vulnerable slam swing is worth exactly 13 lmps the Icelanders had thus managed to tie the match. It had been very entertaining stuff for the world-wide audience The final result would suit either team.

# Round Robin

## Round 3

Looking at Friday's remaining matches in view of the standings one could draw only one conclusion: Group B would probably be more interesting than Group A. In A, Parioli looked certain to go through, together with the team to keep its eye on the ball best when playing them in round 4 or 5. In the other group, the three leading teams had just I V.P. between them and, what is more, they had to play key matches all day long.

The first of these occurred in round 3 when Bamberg, the Germans from North Bavaria, had to meet Allegra Torino from Piemonte in Northern Italy.

This match too, like many of the matches involving Italians we have seen recently here and there, started off as a one-sided affair. The marked difference, however, was that the one-way traffic had Germany as its destination – an unusual sight, certainly from an Italian viewpoint.

It started on board 3 when the Germans were allowed to make a game which could have been defeated at trick land at trick 2:




Once Gotard decided to open this rather unpromising hand (in spite of its two aces) – no doubt he had to, according to his system agreements – the auction developed in responsible fashion. There simply was no way for EW to find out if  $5^{\circ}$  was on or not. Allegra +200.

Once D'Avossa had to pass this rather unpromising hand (in spite of its two aces) the auction took a sharp gambling turn when Madala opened a weak two and Wladow jumped to game in his suit. When 4<sup>th</sup> came back to Wladow, he guessed well to bid one more and was rewarded with a score of +650 and 10 Imps to Bamberg to lead 19-1 now.


Double-dummy this is an easy contract to play as both red suits are breaking 4-4 very obediently. A possible line looks to draw two top trumps before going on cross-ruff lines. A classic line of play, however, is to establish the side suit first. So Bocchi won the  $\Diamond K$  lead and played  $\clubsuit A$  and another. This enabled north to throw two red cards on the  $\clubsuit$ KQ and ruff the fourth round. As declarer still had to lose a natural trump trick he suddenly found himself one down. Bamberg +50.

With less to guide him, D'Avossa led the  $\clubsuit Q$  after which Wladow had an easy enough road to ten tricks. He too won the ace and returned the suit, South winning and giving his partner a ruff. As this was only the second trick for the defence, contrary to what had happened at the other table, the natural trump trick still out meant that Wladow had just made his contract. Bamberg another +420 and 10 more Imps to lead 29-1 at this point.

A difference in hand evaluation caused a swing on board 11:

The good five-card suit was worth an extra trick, so on the same club lead East easily came to the same nine tricks as his counterpart at the other table. Bamberg +150 and 6 Imps back to Turin.

Leading 33-8 already, the Germans reached their maximum lead of the match on board 15:

Piekarek led a heart to Gotard's ace and the suit was returned. Once Bocchi finessed the  $\heartsuit$  rather than a possible  $\clubsuit K$  he had to concede a heart ruff as well and thus quickly was one down. Bamberg +50, a tremendous result for them. Contract Result : 4SW-1

Vulnerable against not, the save is too expensive anyway, certainly so when D'Avossa went down three to lose another 800. Not that it mattered very much: down two would have cost 11 Imps and in real life the swing was a mere 13 Imps. Bamberg now led by 46-8.

Once again, we saw a grand finale with four consecutive swings, three of them being of doublefigure calibre:

The card played in dummy caused a surprise swing here. East led a spade and dummy played the queen, covered by king and ace. Declarer crossed in hearts and led a club to the ten which held, followed by a club to East's ace. From the play to trick one Bocchi deduced that Duboin held the \$9 so he simply continued the suit, declarer winning the jack (!?). Another club went to West's king and a low diamond came back, North obviously going up with the king, his only chance. When the ace proved to be with East declarer had to go down four in his contract for a score of +200 to Allegra.

At this table, declarer played low from dummy and won West's \$9 with his jack. Here too a heart went to the queen and a club went to the ace but East, not being able to profitably return a spade, returned a diamond. West could win his **&**K later as well as three more diamonds but the contract had come home with an overtrick: +120 and 8 Imps to Allegra.



Less careful play led to the Bamberg declarer's downfall. A heart was led to the ace and the  $\bigstar$ A cashed. A spade was ruffed at trick three and declarer created an extra entry to his hand by conceding a club now. South won the queen and returned the king, declarer ruffing. Another spade was ruffed and dummy's  $\diamond$ A cashed. Declarer only now crossed in hearts and tried to ruff another spade, but North overruffed and gave his partner an overruff in clubs. The  $\bigstar$ K was the second undertrick. Allegra a surprise +100 and a muchneeded 11 Imps. The score: 48-27 to Bamberg.

When Gotard led a club to dummy's jack Bocchi had little trouble as this was an extra entry to lead trumps from dummy. As there was no need either to overtake the  $\mathbf{\Phi}Q$ , he made two overtricks for a fine +680 to Allegra.

On a diamond lead to the ace and a diamond return, the  $\Diamond K$  scored declarer's first trick but he still was in trouble. He overtook the  $\bigstar Q$  and advanced the  $\oiint J$  which lost to the king. Back came a diamond, ruffed in hand. The  $\bigstar A$  was cashed and a club ruffed. A heart from dummy to the nine held but as there was no way to reach dummy again declarer still had to concede two trump tricks to North for down one, +100 and the final 13 Imps of the set to Allegra.

The final score thus had become 59-40 or 19-11 V. P. to Bamberg. The group would see a new leader: the Mragowia team from Poland who had just beaten Vestfold all ends up. An interesting two more rounds were in sight.

Historians among us may remember that the 1989 European Junior Bridge Camp took place in Mragowo, a small town in the North-East of the country.





Before the last round started the position in Group A was very clear. Parioli Angelini with 096 V.P. and De Lombard Rotterdam with 91 V.P. had qualified for today's semifinals, both with a match in hand. As it happened, they had to play this final match against each other, for statistical and honorary reasons. Below you will find a hand or two from this encounter.

In Group B, on the other hand, the situation was completely foggy. Four teams were within 9 V.P. of each other and, to make things even more exciting, the leaders had to play the number four and the nos. 2 and 3 also had to meet. So really everything was possible, though Mragowo and Bamberg certainly looked a little better placed at the start of the round. Thus, every reason to look at the matches in this group more closely than at the proceedings in Group A.

After a wake-up slam missed by just one pair and a routine game this was board 3:

Madala made a much better choice by overcalling INT, showing at least the value of his hand. When South bid 2♠ everybody was happy. As Ferraro even managed to make this contract, Allegra scored another +110 and their first 12 Imps. Mind you: they had to win 18-12 to qualify...



What to do with the losing clubs if dummy is void of trumps? On a low spade lead, Bocchi found the solution. He won the ace and drove out the  $\heartsuit A$ . North won the second round and had no good return. His choice was a spade but it did not matter any more. Bocchi played off all his hearts, coming down to this end position:



The last heart is played. South still has a superfluous diamond to throw, but North is in trouble and has to throw a club. Next come the two top diamonds to squeeze South in the black suits.

The rare phenomenon first caused some trouble among the commentators but they finally agreed that the audience had just witnessed a nonsimultaneous double squeeze.

Obviously, if South does not keep on to his clubs declarer can simply cash the suit from the top. Very well played, Allegra +980.

Now look at one of the finest displays of teamwork I ever saw. Quite often, there is a defence to an impending squeeze, consisting of disrupting declarer's communications. This hand proved a wonderful example when Guido Ferraro put the cherry on his teammate's cake by leading a diamond.

With the squeeze broken, declarer had no option but to insert the jack and this had to go down three, losing two clubs in the end and the inevitable ace of trumps. Allegra +150 and 15 Imps to ensure qualification as well as first place in the group, as it turned out.

In the other Italian match, Parioli Angelini v. De Lombard, they also were in  $6^{\circ}$  at both tables and both Souths led a spade.

When Drijver did not play for the squeeze he had to concede one down, Parioli +50.

In the other room, on a spade lead, one would expect the world's No. I bridge player to fulfill his ambitious contract and so it proved. Playing along the same line as Bocchi Lorenzo Lauria also made 12 tricks for a gain of 14 Imps to his team. It also helped Parioli to ensure first place in their group as they earned a winning draw: 43-42 Imps. As Allegra won the other group, the chances of an all-Italian final on Sunday had remained intact.
