A Lot of Sun but no Vacation in Antalya



Technological improvements do not always make life easier. Before the cellular phone age nobody had to worry about the illegal transmission of data by using one. At this moment many players still don't understand why strict measures have to be taken

to avoid such abuse. Before the bridgemate age, last boards in a session were entered the same way as previous ones, not forgotten. The number of participants also created headaches. It is not easy to play four sessions with 22 or even fewer pairs not playing barometer, as we did in the seniors.

And not many of us will be able to cope with 60 or so more pairs in a Mitchell qualification, who drop into the third out of four sessions when those pairs can't just play each other because they are so much stronger than the average in the event. So we had to merge them into existing lines, taking out other pairs and of course we didn't want pairs meeting each other twice. Try it, it appeared to be possible. The power cuts didn't help much either but we survived them, though I heard some cursing going around a couple of times.

The reason we could solve these problems is that the basic requirements were fulfilled. We played in beautiful playing rooms, had playing material of the highest quality and the expertise of our staff is outstanding. Some TD's were experts in movements, the duplication was done without any real mistake, the scoring staff, both for the teams and the pairs, handled the bridgemates, scoring stations and the scores themselves with great precision. There were Italians in almost every department who didn't need much instruction to exercise their jobs. And once again, well done the Turkish Federation, which had previously demonstrated that it understands what is needed to make such an event a great success. This time we cooperated also with Bentour, the tour operator who had a big task in the organization and fulfilled it in a flawless way. By experience my expectations working with hotels were low. I have to review that opinion: Kremlin and Topkapi were highly cooperative; no request was too much for them.

If this all sounds as if life was easy, it was not. You can't imagine how many unexpected things come up, how many split second decisions have to be taken, how many things have to be done in the normal development of such a championship. I am really proud to be part of such organization, which created a championship to be remembered as a delight.

And yes, we always can improve things, hopefully your opinions will help to do so. See you in two years time and bring your friends with you, we are ready for a bigger event.

EBL Seniors Open Forum Friday, 29th June, 2007

The Chairman said there was little time but the meeting was to present the EBL Seniors Committee thinking and give seniors a chance to express their own views.

These were the points the committee was supporting:

- A delay in increasing the age limit from 58 to 60 years to allow people born in 1950 and 1951 to become seniors earlier than if the limit was increased again in 2008 and 2009. Objective: Some new faces.
- Supporting the Seniors Congresses of European Federations not only with EBL Masterpoints but possibly with some title such as EBL Seniors Grand Prix. There was also a proposal being considered that the Italian BF Seniors Congress in Riccione in 2008 might become an EBL Open for Seniors. Such a Congress could include Mixed Senior Pairs, Ladies Senior Pairs, Open Senior Pairs etc. but nothing that would conflict with the national Senior Teams at the main European Championships.
- Points from Antalya: running a Senior Teams and Pairs in parallel with Open events five times the size was impractical. The amount of bridge and cost for Seniors should be reduced. If the Senior events were cut from nine days to six with the Senior Teams starting at the same time as the Open Pairs then Seniors would have the choice of coming for one week or of entering the Open teams with the option, if not reaching the knockouts, of playing in both the Senior Teams and Senior Pairs. (This same schedule could also apply to the Womens events.)
- Points from Verona to be advised to the WBF: (a) qualifying rounds in Senior Pairs should be a maximum of four sessions (possibly three) before a cut, with those missing the cut able to start something new; (b) all Senior events other than the knockouts should have at least one, preferably two, half-days free per week. This would increase enjoyment for those who had other things to do such as watch Viewgraph, hold meetings, or see the locale outside the venue.

Mrs Hiron made an impassioned plea against isolating Seniors into their own venues and events, not alongside Open and Women. This would, she believed, be against the long term interests of bridge. The Chairman assured Mrs. Hiron there was no intention of removing Senior events from any existing EBL event. The aim was to increase participation of Seniors, and give them more options when faced with the decision of whether to play Open or Senior.


Other proposals received general support from the meeting.

Wishful Thinking Solution

Can West make Four Spades if he is allowed to give North and South the appropriate hands (consistent with the bidding...West opened One Spade, North overcalled One No-trump, and East ended the bidding with Four Spades).

North leads the diamond king.

Giorgi Uchava and Rati Burdiashvili of Georgia (apparently in cooperation) were drawn as winners among the correct solutions. They suggested:



If this is the full deal East wins trick one, takes two heart finesses and two diamond ruffs. A heart to the ace is followed by a fourth diamond, ruffed with the trump seven.

Finally the thirteenth heart is ruffed with the king, and West's fifth diamond allows dummy to make a trick with the spade ten either directly or later if North ruffs in with an honour.



Some final boards - Session 4

This Championship has come to an end, but there are still some boards to report from the final.

Board 3. Dealer South. E/W Vul.

Five Hearts would have been a good save for the Poles, and three pairs in the field indeed took the insurance. Balicki





knew that it was likely that the save wouldn't cost too much, so he gave it a thought and then passed out Five Clubs, as he hoped to beat the club game instead. Balicki was not confident that Five Clubs would be defeated, so he refrained from doubling, and right he was. Zmudzinski led a heart, which gave David Gold the opportunity to draw trumps and then played the diamond king to Zmudzinski's ace, noticing the ten dropping from North. That was two bits of good news on the same trick. The king of spades was now guarded and if the defence don't cash their ace in this position a spade from dummy will disappear on a high diamond. N/S -600 was worth 84% for Gold/Townsend.

Three pairs took ten tricks in Three No-Trumps, recording –630 for a 96%-board.

How interesting can a stone cold grand slam be? Well, first and foremost you have to bid it, and that's not all – you might also have to pick the correct grand. David Gold – Tom Townsend bid without flourishes up to Seven Diamonds.

South led a club and Gold asked Balicki if there was a ruff. He shook his head, thus Gold could claim all the tricks; N/S –2140 but no gold for that as it was worth only 42% for E/W. Eight pairs bid Seven No-Trumps, and there was not much to the play. Alan and David Birman of Israel was one of the pairs. They reached the no-trump grand in this way:



Over Blackwood East showed two aces and the diamond queen. When West had the strength to bid Six Spades, showing a singleton spade and good values, with an extra diamond it has to be 13 tricks, David Birman thought, and simply emptied his bidding-box. NS –2220 was worth 86% for E/W.

Gotthard/Dumbovich flopped on this board, as they stopped in Four Hearts. Well, that was a pessimistic view, but a blessing in disguise was that a grand slam in hearts would not make, as North has to win a trump trick...



The Dutch pair Louk Jr Verhees – Jan Jansma hunted for a medal and on board 11 they took win against Greger

Bjarnarson – Michael Askgaard of Denmark. North led the club ace and then shifted to a heart, covered by the king and won by the ace. South fired back clubs and after winning the club king North exited with another club, which declarer ruffed in hand. The diamond ace and the two red queens were cashed. Declarer ruffed a heart in dummy, North discarded a club (insignificant), and then cashed the trump ace. North was thrown in on a diamond, which he had to ruff since he only had trumps left. North should have another trump trick holding Q-J-5, but declarer two tricks holding K-10-8. N/S –470 was worth a useful 96% board.

As the cards lay the contract cannot be defeated. North just needs a slightly higher spade than the five. If I have worked it out correctly, the seven of spades in North's hand insted of the five would be the difference between heaven and hell, as it gives the defence the possibility to defeat the contract.

Eleven E/W-pairs managed to take nine tricks in Notrumps, one of them even got doubled, as the defence didn't find a way to take all four club tricks and the heart ace. Three No-trumps went down at only five tables.



Marvellous Mari

The Senior Pairs Final featured not only the current World Senior Champions but also several former World Open champions including Christian Mari. Here is a deal in which the field failed in Four Spades whilst Mari found a line that required accurate defence to prevent him making an overtrick!

Senior "A" Final Session 3 Board 13. Dealer North. All Vul.



South, Mike Tedd, led a diamond. A club went from dummy and the king was beaten by the ace. Some declarers unblocked the queen of hearts and then played ace and another trump, but this led to one off when North could draw the third trump and play a club through the king. Mari, instead, after unblocking the heart, ruffed a diamond, and cashed two top hearts throwing his two clubs from hand. Next he ducked a trump.


As North I rose with the king and, to prevent declarer making eleven, was compelled to play the jack of diamonds, forcing another trump from dummy. Mari now cashed the ace of trumps and led a winning heart. North ruffed at once and played a club. But Mari ruffed in the East hand and played a fourth diamond. He was left with a trump and winning diamond at the end. Mari shared his top with one other declarer.

Last Chance Saloon

The Great Shuffler had decreed that the two pairs who had been fighting all day for the gold and silver medals would meet in Round 10 of the last session of the final.



Once North found his partner had spades he preempted to the hilt, but East was not to be denied. What is more, the Bulgarians were playing Five Hearts from the right side. North led the ace of spades and continued the suit. Declarer ruffed, ran the nine of hearts and then ran the jack of hearts. South won and returned a heart but declarer had the rest. +650 and 98% for East/West.



North led the ten of clubs and South won and returned the two. Declarer won and played a spade to the ten. South took the ace and played a third club. Declarer won that, played a spade to the jack and a heart. South went up with the ace and played a diamond, but declarer put up the ace, unblocked the queen of hearts and played a spade. That was nine tricks, +150 and 80% - the Bulgarians were home and dry.

Bermuda Bowl, Venice Cup & Seniors Bowl World Transnational Open Teams Championships From 29th September to 13th October

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

(Provisional Programme)

The Opening Ceremony will be on 29th September 2007, at the invitation of Chinese Bridge Association.

The Bermuda Bowl, Venice Cup & Senior Bowl: Round Robin will start on Sunday 30th September and finish on Saturday 14th October, with the final knock-out stages starting on Sunday 7th.

In these 3 events the Quarter Final will end before the start of the Transnational Open Teams on Monday 8th October, allowing people who want to play this event to be free on time.

The Closing Ceremony, which will include the prize giving, followed by a victory banquet/or Cocktail will take place on Saturday 13th October.

In accordance with the provisional schedule, the play will start daily at 10.00/10.30 a.m. and finish at 7.30/8.30 p.m., except on Oct 8th when play will be extended to 11.00/11.30 p.m.

THE WORLD TRANSNATIONAL OPEN TEAMS

The 6th World Transnational Open Teams Championships is a prestigious and most enjoyable event. Being Transnational, it

is open to teams composed of players coming from different countries, nominated by their National Bridge Organisation and approved by the WBF Credentials Committee.

It is a great opportunity for players to participate in a wonderful bridge tournament while at the same time having a unique opportunity to experience all the atmosphere and excitement of the final stages of the Bermuda Bowl and Venice Cup and watch some of the greatest players in the world on the first class vugraph presentation. Players wishing to compete in this Championship should contact their NBO and request nomination by the end of July 2007. There is no quota, and NBOs may nominate as many teams as they wish to compete in this great tournament.

Players eliminated from the Round Robin of the Bermuda Bowl & Venice Cup, as well as those from the Seniors Bowl will be able to enter the World Transnational Open Teams Championship free of charge if they enter as a complete team. If they join players who are coming to Shanghai just to play in this event, then a substantial discount on the entry fee is offered.

The World Transnational Open Teams will take place during the second week, starting in the late afternoon on Monday 8th October. The format will be Swiss Teams. It is normally played as 10-board matches (3, 4 or 5 per day) for 15 qualifying rounds (150 boards). The Quarter Final will start on Thursday late afternoon, the Semi Final will be played on Friday 12th October and the Final will end on Saturday 13th October.
