Congratulations to Europe who won the Second Buffett Cup held over four days at the Galt House Hotel in Louisville, Kentucky.

Match Report on the Individual

Running score at the end of the teams:

USA 126.5

Europe 119.5

Each player is drawn to compare permanently with a particular player on the other team and never meets that player. A player partners in turn, for 6 boards, each of the other 11 members of their own team.

The four players at one table always have their counterparts playing in the same seats at the comparing table. After comparison of the 6 boards each of the four players on the winning side earn I point for their continent i.e. the continent receives 4 points for a win or 2 for a draw. With three comparisons and II rounds there are I32 points at stake in the Individual. The winning target is 189.5 overall.

On the final day Europe needed 42 Matchpoints of 84, whereas the USA needed 44.

Note that Dick Freeman, 75, the oldest player on either team was drawn to compare with Thomas Bessis, 24, not quite the youngest on the European team (Marion Michielsen is 23). The average age of the European team was 37, younger than the youngest member of the USA team (Geoff Hampson, 40). In fact the difference in average age was roughly 20 years. And yet the teams were close to a tie almost throughout the

North led the $\heartsuit 9$ to West's ten. Taking the clue from South's take-out double, Helness laid down the king of spades. When South contributed the queen, he ran the ten and made II tricks.

Zia was in Three Notrumps from the North seat. This can be beaten by a heart lead. However, diamonds were unbid and Helness duly led a low diamond to his partner's king. Zia ducked! That risked losing the game had West found the heart switch. But West continued diamonds. Now Zia put in the ten and East won. The game was now safe but the bonus from Zia's deceptive play now arrived. East has to find a spade switch to hold declarer to nine tricks. If there was a warning bell in the play of the diamond suit, Helness did not hear it. A third diamond allowed declarer to wrap up ten tricks and win the board.

Each continent was playing a standard system agreed by them. South's choice to bid INT in response to I^{\odot} was surprising. For the USA team this was a forcing NT, for the Europeans it was not. As it was not alerted Helness might have been misled into expecting a weaker dummy, but Zia still had problems in making game.

The king of spades lead was won in dummy, a diamond was led to hand and the queen of hearts ran and won. Zia now cashed his second diamond and led a low club to the jack and queen, observing East's contribution of the nine.

Declarer now has the option of playing for clubs

Declarer now has the option of playing for clubs to be 3-3, or for East to have the bare ace (note that doubleton 98 can be ruled out as the defence would now take a ruff).

Zia got this right, playing low on the next round of clubs. He therefore wrapped up 4%x. This won the board when the comparing table was 4%-1.

A spade was led to East's ten and a trump came back. Hamman finessed the ten. Brogeland won and exited with the king of hearts. Now Hamman smartly led the queen of diamonds from hand. Brogeland won with the king and had to decide on his exit.

First imagine he leads a spade. Declarer has two entries to dummy with diamond ruffs and can set up and enjoy two spade tricks for club discards. So that was out.

What about a diamond? Declarer can win the ten, and play two more rounds of diamonds, discarding two clubs from dummy! West has to win the fourth diamond and is endplayed again, this time fatally. Declarer either makes a spade or the king of clubs as his extra trick.

Finally Brogeland worked out that the safest exit was ace and another club. Though that gave South the king he only had two trumps in dummy to take care of three losers and the doubled contract had to fail.

Michel began to regret responding on the North cards as his partner forced the auction higher and higher. But when he saw dummy he became much happier.

East led a trump. This was won in dummy and a diamond was played to the ten and queen. Bessis won the next trump in his own hand and led the ten of hearts covered by the jack and ace.

West ruffed with his last trump and exited with the queen of clubs. Bessis cashed the second top club and cross-ruffed clubs and diamonds until his trumps had gone.

He then exited with a low heart to the seven and nine. As East had only hearts left he was end-played into leading away from the heart queen. Four Spades was home.
