Live draughts

Twenty out of eighty games of each round in the international draughts tournament are being live broadcasted. You can see them in the tiny analysis room next to the playing area. The draughts enthusiasts not present in this arena can see each and every move while keeping their eyes peeled on the internet. The website of their choice www.wmsg-draughts.org

In the fourth round an interesting game to watch was the meeting of Tanja Chub from the Netherlands and the Latvian leader of the group at the start of the round: Zoja Golubeva. Chub chose a brilliant plan in the middle game: from a difficult position, she forced her respectable opponent (a ninefold world champion) in an endgame in which Golubeva was two pieces behind, but close to king. However, promotion was only possible after sacrificing another piece, giving Chub a major advantage, which she securely exchanged for a win.

In the men's tournament, Alexander Getmanski from Russia beat Pim Meurs. This Dutch talent probably was not aware that it was Getmanski's birthday, for there were no presents on the draughts board. Meurs went for the attack directly from the opening, but the Russian grandmaster's counter-attack came quickly. The struggle for the center was then won by Getmanski, so Meurs's only refuge was an endgame with two pieces less. In this, Getmanski showed his accuracy and didn't make a single mistake, thereby forcing Meurs to resign after more than five hours of play. The online spectators then had a one-hour break before a new round with 20 games was there to watch.

WMSG Press Conference

Jos Jacobs reports from Beijing's BICC

On Thursday afternoon, the Organizing Committee of the 1st World Mind Sports Games held a Press Conference on the second floor of the BICC. In a packed conference room, Mr Chu Bo welcomed everyone on behalf of the Committee and then handed the microphone to Mrs Xiao Min, assistant Minister of General Sports Administration in China. In her welcome address, she presented a review of the preparations made to ensure the success of this event, the third major sports competition in Beijing following the Olympic Games and the Paralympics. The China General Administration of Sport and its Board and Card Games Administrative Center have cooperated with the People's Government of Beijing and the Municipal Bureau of Sports to organize all aspects of this event for the nearly 3,000 players and about 600 staff people involved, representing no less than 143 countries in all.

Next, Mr Liu Siming, the Director General of the Board and Card Games Administrative Center, took the microphone to welcome the audience. He drew attention to the fact that the preparations of these Games only started in May 2007, so a tremendous job had been done in a relatively short time. Then,

he gave some important details about the various sports competitions.

In all, 35 gold medals will be awarded: 9 for Bridge, 10 for Chess, 6 for Go, 5 for Draughts and 5 for Xiangqi. There will also be a trophy of honour, awarded by the IMSA to the country ranking first in the final Gold Medals and medals standings.

The Organizing Committee's job was enlightened because they could profit from the experience gained by the Beijing Olympic Organizing Committee

about the working method and mode for press and publicity. The Committee also cooperated with Air China, the WMSG global partner, in the field of air tickets service to overseas players. Shanghai General Motors Buick is the sponsor of WMSG vehicles. China Network Communications Group provides network equipment and service. Aigo provides Miaobi products and technical services as the exclusive provider of the digital products and storage devices. Yongming Pearl Palace Co. Ltd. from Naning, Guangxi, provides pearl gifts for the 1st WMSG. Grace Pearl Co. Ltd. provides special gifts for the 1st WMSG. Anta provides uniforms for the Chinese delegation and staff. Motorola China Electronics provides wireless communication products. Nestle provides beverages for the Chinese delegation. Zhuyeqing Tea will be the exclusive tea gifts for the Games. Star Chess and Cards Zhejiang provides games equipments.

Finally, Mr José Damiani, the IMSA President, thanked the Organizing Committee and the people of Beijing and China for their fine achievements so far. He then confirmed the plan to award a trophy to the country winning most gold medals and informed the audience there would also be trophies for the

country winning most gold medals in each separate sport.

In the second part of the Press Conference, the journalists present were given the opportunity to ask questions to the ladies and gentlemen behind the green table. As a number of journalists from various Chinese media, both TV and newspapers, asked a few specific questions, some interesting points were made in the various replies.

For example, Mr Damiani made it very clear that he felt much happier and more relaxed now about this event than when the same journalist, Mr Xu Xun, asked him this same question one year ago. He would hopefully feel even more relaxed, Mr Damiani added, in a fortnight's time from now...

Another issue raised were the requirements a Mind Sport should meet with to become a member of the IMSA. Basically, there are two main criteria. The game should not contain any element of luck rather than ability and skill, and the game should preferably be spread over all continents of the world. Bridge and Chess, already recognised by the IOC, easily meet with

both these criteria; Draughts and Go are both spread over various parts over the world as well, though possibly played less frequently everywhere. Xiangqi is not yet a member of the IMSA, due to the fact that as it stands today, it is restricted to some big parts of Asia only. Still, it is very frequently played, as the number of players in China alone already stands at about 100 million (!). Its inclusion in this 1st WMSG may well lead to the game becoming much better known outside Asia too. Here in China, Xiangqi is a popular enough game even on TV: in the province of

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Inner Mongolia, they even have a TV channel fully dedicated to Xiangqi.

These WMSG are an excellent occasion, more generally speaking, for each Mind Sport to get better known among the players competing here in a different discipline. A good example of the opposite of Xiangqi would be Draughts: this game was practically unknown in China before these WMSG were being staged in this country, so fond of board and card games. It is estimated that every day, an average of 80 million Chinese are playing all types of card and board games, both luck and skill games, online.

A very special question was the one in which Mr Damiani was invited to make a prediction about which country would win the 1st overall IMSA Trophy. Mr Damiani's personal, careful prediction was that this might very well be the hosts!

A warm word of "Thank You" by Mr Chu Bo, in which Mrs Xiao Min, Mr Liu Siming and Mr José Damiani gracefully joined, then concluded the Press Conference.

The Open Event

The third day of the Games featured a return to sunshine and blue skies and the beginning of the open event in the go section. Open means open only to amateurs, and many of the non-Asian countries put their best players into this event. One of these is Fernando Aguilar, the Argentine who beat two 9-dan pros in the first Toyota and Denso Cup. Playing on the top board in block A, he found himself matched against 2005 world amateur champion Hu Yuqing of China, and went down to defeat. More successful was British 6-dan Tony Goddard, who defeated 5-dan lo Kingpeng of Macau China. In some other closely-matched games, Georghe Cornel Burzo of Romania defeated Milos Bojanic of Serbia, Jo Taewon of DPR Korea defeated Kuo Naifu of Chinese Taipei, and Yen Tingyu of Singapore defeated Chan Naisan of Hong Kong China.

Standings of this event will regularly appear from tomorrow onwards.

The Men's individual event

In the men's individual event, a Korean finally lost: Baek Hongsuk was defeated by Yamada Kimio of Japan, who is now owns the lead in block C.

Elsewhere, Wang Xi (China) defeated Michael Redmond (USA) in block E; Wang Mingwan (O Meien) of Chinese Taipei handed Yang Shihai of Hong Kong China his second defeat in block F; and in the battle of unbeaten players in block G Park Younghun of the Republic of Korea won against Sakai Hideyuki of Japan. There is now one undefeated player in each of the eight blocks, but the question of who will continue into the best-of-sixteen final knockout will be decided by the results of the sixth round this afternoon, with much depending on SOS tie-break points.

The women's individual event


In the third round of the women's individual event, Australian pro Joanne Missingham notched her third straight victory, this time beating Pan Kunyu of Chinese Taipei, who plays professionally in Japan. Fellow-Australian Xuehi (Cathy) Zhang also won, defeating pro Kan Ying of Hong Kong. Of the three high-flying DPR Korean women, only Hwang Kyongju emerged unscathed from this round, defeating Yoshihara (Umezawa) Yukari of Japan. In the next round Hwang will test herself against the world's best: Rui Naiwei of China, who now plays professionally in the Republic of Korea.

A Charm Named "Xiangqi Spirit"

It is the venue of Xiangqi men's rapid, being held on the 1st day of the World Mind Sports Games. Here the wise men and famous players are gathering in the Arena. The intense atmosphere can be felt even from the 1st set of the 1st round as if one move is enough to win everything.

Apart from the Chinese players in red, the most striking to me is the oldest person present at the venue: the delegate of Honduras, Mr.Yi Kam Siu. He is often called Mr.Yu Kuai, which means "happy" in Chinese.

The first meeting with Mr. Yu Kuai was at the Drawing Lots Ceremony, Oct. 3rd, which made an indelible impression on me. He is an old man who is always busy and vigorous; but he is also the one who would always forget where the Xiangqi competition venue is. He is an ethnic Chinese who can speak fluently Guangdong dialect, English and Spanish; but he is also the one that persists in talking to us in his broken Chinese. He is a friend who always greets and smiles at the volunteers every time he passes by.

With all the cordial and honorable feeling, I started the talk with Mr.Yu Kuai after the closing of the 1st day's competition.

He told me he is the secretary of the Yee Fung Toy Society of Montreal Chinese Chess Association. Xiangqi is a career to him. He also told me that playing Xiangqi is even more toilsome than physical exercises; the intense situation can always make him nervous or even soaked with sweat; in spite of all that he still feels exhilarative. In the last twenty years, he has returned three times to his motherland. This time well across the distances and spaces he came back again for Xiangqi. Xiangqi is his love towards China.

Mr.Yu Kuai's performance at the games is not very ideal, but he is still the focus of attention for many people. There is a charm named "Xiangqi Spirit" in him. That is the spirit of equanimity, aspiration and persistence, which is sparkling around the whole venue.

World Xiangqi Federation

The World Xiangqi Federation, abbreviated as WXF, was founded on April 6th, 1993 during the 3rd World Xiangqi Championships in Beijing, China. The current President is Timothy Fok; the First Vice-President is Liu Siming (also the President of the Chinese Xiangqi Association); and the Secretary General is Liu Xiaofang (female, also the Secretary General of the Chinese Xiangqi Association). The Secretariat is located in Beijing.

The objectives of the World Xiangqi Federation are:

I.to promote the development of Xiangqi in the world, to organize and develop xiangqi activities internationally.

2.to encourage and assist the xiangqi organizations affiliated to the Federation to organize diversified xiangqi activities.

3.to promote exchanges and cooperation among xiangqi organizations in various countries (regions) through xiangqi activities, to enhance friendship among peoples as well as xiangqi fans of all nations.

The Executive Committee Members hold an office of a period of four years, and may be re-elected. The Executive Committee consists of six permanent working units: the Secretariat, the Study Sub-Committee, the Financial Sub-Committee, the Popularization Sub-Committee, the Competition Sub-Committee, and the Qualification Sub-Committee. The Secretary General is in charge of the Secretariat and is responsible for the day-to-day affairs of the Federation.

The World Xiangqi Championship is organized biennially. 23 member associations of the Federation participated in the 10th World Xiangqi Championship held in Paris, 2007.

The World Xiangqi Federation and the xiangqi activities organized by the Federation respect the International Mind Sports Association and agree with its objectives and aims as well as the General Principles of the World Mind Sports Games.

About Go

The history of Go stretches back some 3000 years, and the rules have remained essentially unchanged throughout this very long period. The game probably originated in China or the Himalayas. Mythology has it that the future of Tibet was once decid-

ed over a Go board, when the Buddhist ruler refused to go into battle; instead he challenged the aggressor to a game of Go to avoid bloodshed. In the Far East, where it originated, Go enjoys great popularity today, and interest in the game is growing steadily.

Go is a territorial game. The board, marked with a grid of 19 lines by 19 lines, may be thought of as a piece of land to be shared between the two players. One player has a supply of black pieces, called stones, the other a supply of white. The game starts with an empty board and the players take turns, placing one stone at each turn on a vacant point. Black plays first, and the stones are placed on the intersections of the lines rather than in the squares. Once played, stones are not moved. However they may be surrounded and so captured, in which case they are removed from the board as prisoners.

The players normally start by staking out their claims to parts of the board which they intend eventually to surround and thereby make into territory. However, fights between enemy groups of stones provide much of the excitement in a game, and can result in dramatic exchanges of

territory. At the end of the game the players count one point for each vacant intersection inside their own territory, and one point for every stone they have captured. The one with the larger total is the winner.

Capturing stones is certainly one way of gaining territory, but one of the subtleties of Go is that aggression does not always pay. The strategic and tactical possibilities of the game are endless, providing a challenge and enjoyment to players at every level. The personalities of the players emerge very clearly on the Go board. The game reflects the skills of the players in balancing attack and defence, making stones work efficiently, remaining flexible in response to changing situations, timing, analysing accurately and recognising the strengths and weaknesses of the opponent.
